



Because the warp threads alternated in color every two threads, it was easier to see any errors in the blocks as the weaving progressed.

I only had a 15 dent reed with this loom that I borrowed for the pandemic, and would have preferred a 10 dent reed.

There were 360 ends in the warp, six repeats of 60 threads each with the addition of a floating selvage at


the addition of a floating selvage at each edge; hemming was done by hand. The hem was woven for 24 shots with Guttermann cotton sewing thread to reduce bulk.

The towel was washed on a regular cycle in a mesh bag and dried on the *cotton* heat setting in the dryer.



Traditional twill threadings like the Ms & Ws I used lend themselves to treadling variations. This towel includes straight, point, as-drawn-in, and several variations I "unvented" while playing around with Fiberworks. In the MAFA Samples Database, there is a second .wif file showing all the treadlings I



considered when designing this towel. (Remember to add tabby if you used the overshot treadling at the end.) Of course, you can also create treadling variations at the loom by alternating odd and even treadles as the spirit moves you, or by applying concepts from structures such as overshot. I hope that this towel inspires you to create something that is uniquely yours. I'm also using this warp to weave my swatches for Jockey Hollow Weavers' annual exchange; this year's theme is "Red," for the guild's 40th (ruby) anniversary. (2021 is also the ruby anniversary of the first MAFA conference; JHW's founders were inspired to create a guild in their area after attending the conference.) And, being a lazy weaver, I'm also using this warp to weave additional squares for Violet Protest, a public art project created by Ann Morton. (www.violetprotest.com/about)

sett: 20 epi (2/dent in 10-dent reed)

ENDS: (22 ends/repeat * 16 repeats) + 11 (M to balance) + 24 (border) = 387

width in reed: 19.65"

HEM: $\frac{1}{2}$ " turned hem \rightarrow 1.5". Wove in a scrap piece of 5/2 to mark the folds; pulled this yarn right before pressing the hem just prior to machine-sewing.

BORDER: 12 picks, about 1/2"


edge pattern: 3.5''

BAND PATTERN: ~ 2" (49 picks)

BODY PATTERN: 12.5"

4 picks of plainweave metallic to separate patterns

Mirror second half (which I did not do as precisely as I had intended.) Used a weighted floating selvage. Draw-in was greater than expected; used a temple. Shrinkage after machine washing and drying was 10% widthwise and negligible lengthwise (which makes me suspect I mis-measured when it was on the loom; I would have expected 10-15%).

The threading is huck-a-back blocks from Marguerite Davison's *A Handweaver's Pattern Book*."

I was inspired when Judith, a member of our guild, wove this for our April 2021 newsletter sample.

This was fun. I put on five yards of warp, total of 562 ends (used floating selvages). I had a 20 inch width and wove 32 inches in length. I threaded one inch plainweave on each side and wove two

inches of plainweave at the bottom. I wove the ½ inch hem in finer cottolin so that it would have less bulk. The weave is a standard huck lace and is very versatile. Lots of different treadling patterns.



My stripes are based on Fibonacci numbers. I started with one repeat in cottolin, then a blue stripe of one repeat, then one beige repeat again, then a blue stripe, then two beige repeats, blue stripe and lastly three cottolin repeats and a blue stripe. The beige cottolin stripes are following the Fibonacci

blue stripe. The beige cottolin stripes are following the Fibonacci sequence of adding the last two numbers together - 1,1,2,3. The next number would be 5. I use this sequence often.



The weaving width in the reed was 20.75". I like the look and enjoy the process of hemming by hand. Changing weft colors gives so many different variations and shades and made it a fun project to weave.

I just started weaving in August 2020. My fiber friends, who are also weavers, encouraged me to join Jane Stafford's Online Guild. I fell in love with Jane's boucle towel kits and bought two for the colors. However, I wanted to try something I had not seen, towels woven with 8/4 cotton as warp, with the goal being a thick absorbent towel with texture. For added texture, the warp <image>

in the center was created by alternating 8/4 cotton warp with a matching boucle yarn. I wanted to see if there would be much difference between the combo 8/4 cotton + cotton boucle versus 8/4 cotton alone.

The towel weft was woven with boucle alone, alternating colors and weaving inches to follow Fibonacci sequences (1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 5, 3, 2, 1). Color progression: aqua, orange, light green, fuchsia, and purple. I wanted the colors to play together in the towel to create visual interest. While I was very reluctant to weave with purple boucle as part of my design, I found this color series one of my favorites. Interestingly, after finishing, there did not seem to be a great textural difference between the areas woven with the 8/4 cotton + boucle combo or in the 8/4 cotton warp alone.


The hems were woven with 16/2 cotton and hand stitched. I hope you will enjoy this towel as much as I enjoyed weaving it!

This is the oldest, simplest, and most traditional Scottish tartan. It is variously known as Shepherd's Check, Houndstooth, or Northumberland (Northumbria) tartan, as that is the area where it originated. I can just imagine those early medieval weavers deciding to add a little variety to their monotonous weaving experience by alternating the wool of black and light sheep. I chose this pattern because Northumberland County (Virginia) is the county where our



Guild is located. I first became fascinated with tartans and their history when I took Melissa Weaver Dunning's Tartan class at MAFA 2019!

You can add any variation of trim detail that you'd like; I used a simple 1 inch all-white stripe about 4 inches from the bottom.

The original draft I found on the Schacht website had 414 ends, so I adjusted to 430 ends to meet the necessary width requirement.

I also used a simplified threading, a draft of which was supplied to me by Judie Eatough. I machine washed the towel in cold water and dried in the dryer on high heat to wet set. The towel was then pressed using a cotton and steam setting on my iron.


I used a 12 yard warp of 8/2 ring spun cotton and used Brassard's 8/2 cotton for weft in the color Vieu Blue.

The towel was machine hemmed.

I love weaving these towels as the pattern is so easy to memorize and you can just weave almost without thought. The easy simplified threading I used makes threading the heddles an easy task.

I used a Josephine Estes miniature, "Cambridge Beauty" (www2.cs.arizona. edu/patterns/weaving/monographs/ eje_min1.pdf), to design this towel. I added some striped segments that altered the miniature repeats to create the structured effect I was seeking in the towel.

735 ends plus 2 FS each side.

I played with the treadling to create many different versions of the towels. The draft

shows the treadling for the main pattern repeat. For the towel submitted, I used a segment of the treadling repeat for the border along each edge of the towel and then wove some plain weave with striping before starting to weave the main pattern repeat.



This is my expression of pansies viewed through a window. Used Kathryn Weber's Blazing Shuttles for warp with white cotton and purple accents for warp.

Structure was plainweave with two overshot accents in the weft—one narrow purple and one wider of white. Floating selvages were used with 411 ends.


Towel was hand washed in hot water, air dried, and pressed with a dry iron. Fringe ending and handstitched selvage edge hems.

I have not been able to weave at home for over five years and this project was a great challenge for renewing the weaving cells in my brain. A fun project.





Six towels were woven then zigzagged on the sewing machine. They were washed and dried in the dryer then cut apart and hemmed. The hemming area was plainweave.

For these towels, the threading (right to left) was: Grey 20, White 4, Grey 12, White 4, Grey 24, Cannell 48, White 40, Sage 56, Grey 64, then reverse for mirror image).



On this warp I wove 4 towels, and all have different treadling and design, although the same weft colors were used for all four. Hems are hand stitched.

I am a novice weaver, and this is my 10th project. I had initially planned this project for 40/2 linen, but I was unable to find colored linen in that grist. Scaled up for 16/2 linen the pattern is more dramatic and the cloth is robust. This wasn't what I envisioned when I planned the project, but I am satisfied with the outcome. It's not perfect, but it is perfectly functional. I hope it will provide many years of service.

I wove on a Glimåkra Standard using 8 shafts. A ladder hemstitched section




was added after a partial pattern repeat and it was reversed to duplicate the design on the second hem. Both hems are hand sewn with linen thread.

Initial size was 33.5" x 19.5"; hemmed it was 31" x 19.5" and final size after washing and pressing is 29.75" x 18.5". I hard pressed with a heavy iron to give the linen a polished appearance. There are 392 ends in the warp with a partial repeat at one end to have similar left and right sides in the finished towel. This is in the attached WIF. Likewise there is a partial repeat and a reverse in the hems, for the same reason. It's shown on the beginning of the file only. I sleyed 1 end per dent in a 20 dent reed.

I wove with a temple and the weft was wetted on the bobbins to help it beat in well and make a more dense cloth. I wove this without floating selvages but the pattern would benefit from them. The colors do not alternate 1:1. Because of this, to make sure all the warp ends were caught in each pick, the shuttles had to cross sometimes in one direction, other times the reverse. It made for slower weaving and uneven selvages.

The original source of this color-and-weave design is: *Die Färbige Gewebermusturung* by Franz Donat, published in 1907. This particular draft is a figure from Master Plate XLVIII No. 6A, Motif 4.



This towel is a design to combine waffle and tabby. I used five shafts for the waffle areas and three shafts for the tabby areas. For the waffle areas I sett the ends at 32 epi, tighter than the tabby areas of 24 epi. I also added several different

colors for the waffle stripes while the majority of the warp is a dark neutral color.

WARP: 22/2 cottolin. Colors: tobacco 2017, maize, gold 2054, orange 2015, aqua 2032, pine 2065

WEFT: Hem: 16/2 cotton, orange 62. Body: 22/2 cottolin. Colors: ochre 2011, maize, gold 2054, orange 2015, aqua 2032, pine 2065

DIMENSIONS BEFORE WASHING: 21 7/8 inches wide and 36 1/4 inches long


AFTER WASHING: 20 inches wide and 32 ¹/₄ inches long Warm water; regular cycle; iron while damp; no dryer
