Can Your Guild Use a MAFA grant?

Applications for 2018 MAFA grants will be due in January for projects taking place between March 2018 and April 2019. All guilds are eligible, but guilds new to the grant program are given priority. Award amounts vary depending on the project, but generally range between \$500 and \$1,500 with 50 percent of the grant award paid up front and the remainder upon receipt of a final report with photos.


Outgoing President's Message
